Have you seen any of this year's Christmas TV ads yet? From French and Saunders to Kevin the Carrot, many old favourites can be seen in them. And while they advertise their respective shops' wonderful Christmas offers: wreaths and baubles, festive clothing, and above all, the seasonal food and drink on offer, some of them look at more serious topics this year. They appear to take into account that for many people this year, Christmas won't be an easy period, that the cost-of-living crisis might make it more difficult this year to splash out quite as much, to light up all those sparkly lamps, to provide a stunning Christmas buffet. There are some that feature somewhat more modest displays, while others highlight causes such as fostering, and animal shelters.

It's a bit ironic really, don't you think, that Christmas has become something that foremost seems to be about the decorations, the lights, the clothing and the food – not to forget the presents – when it all really started in a small stable, among farm animals, and with people who didn't have party clothes. If we trust the age-old stories, there nevertheless were some sparkles, as the angels descended amidst the starlight, there was celebration as the shepherds arrived to see that miracle, and there were presents, too, brought by Wise Men from the East. That's what Christmas comes down to – parents welcoming a new-born baby, a community coming together across the divides of background, homeland or means, and new hope for the world. God coming into the world, God showing the world the extravagance of love in becoming human, and love outshining everything else – that is what Christmas is about.

Jesus was born in a time of unrest, a time of uncertainty and conflict. Mary and Joseph had their struggles, before Jesus was born, and afterwards, too, when they were forced to flee to Egypt to keep their baby safe. And yet, their love overcame all the difficulties, and in their little baby the world would find new hope: the hope that no matter how dark times might be, new light will shine through, a new beginning is always possible.

Whether you believe in the stories of the shepherds, angels and the Wise Men or not, I wish us all this Advent and Christmas time that we can find light – literally and metaphorically – that we will hold on to hope, and that we'll celebrate love: God's love for the world, the love we share with our communities and our families and friends, the love that holds everything together.


#### **Advent and Christmas**


# Exploring the Bible, and what it can mean for us today

... That's what we're trying to do in our services each week – finding meaning for our everyday lives in these century-old stories, many of which were

handed down by storytelling for long periods before they were ever written down, and translated and retranslated into the versions we have available to us today. As you may know, the majority of churches follow a prescribed schedule of Bible readings, with many using the three-



year cycle of the Revised Common
Lectionary. This schedule lists Bible passages for each
Sunday of the year over a three-year period, and
covers many – though not all – parts of the Bible.
Each of its three years focusses on one of the socalled synoptic gospels, that is the gospels according
to Matthew, Mark and Luke, with John's Gospel
featuring periodically in-between. The lectionary
cycle begins with the new church year, starting on
the first Sunday of Advent. For this coming year, we'll
again largely follow the lectionary, and will consider
the stories particularly through a focus on the



women we meet in them.
Two recent publications,
Ashley Wilcox' The
Women's Lectionary and
Joan Taylor's and Helen
Bond's (New Testament
Professor at New
College Edinburgh)
Women Remembered
will be valuable
resources for our
explorations. If you

played games. Each time, we also say thank you to God for things we're happy about, and ask God to care for the things we worry about. With stories, peg dolls and crafts, we've learned about Jesus and his life – meeting his first disciples, welcoming children, feeding lots of people, caring for one another. We're just about to think about Advent and the Nativity story, too. Join us fortnightly on Friday afternoons, 2pm-3.30 in the Session Rooms in East Saltoun. There's also softplay for younger



children, and coffees and teas for parents, grandparents and carers. We meet again on 9 Dec, 6 and 20 Jan, 3 and 24 Feb, 10 and 24 Mar, 21 April and 5 and 19 May (please note gaps in February and April due to school holidays!)

# The future of our church buildings

The Presbytery Plan for our area will be finalised very soon, and on 1st January, the current Lothian Presbytery (which covers all Church of Scotland congregations in East and Midlothian) will join together with the Presbyteries of Jedburgh, Duns and Melrose & Peebles to form the new Presbytery of Lothian & Borders. The new Presbytery Clerk will be the Rev Norman Smith, formerly minister of Granton Church in Edinburgh and a past Convener of the national Mission & Discipleship Council, and, as it happens, the son-in-law of our own Paul Sales.

As you know, the restructuring is much needed to respond to the reducing membership numbers, lower income, and decreasing numbers of ministers. With smaller congregations and less income, it simply is no longer sustainable to maintain the number of church buildings across Scotland. Every congregation maintains their own buildings, so when the membership and income of a congregation reduce, it isn't always possible to maintain a church building. In our case, we currently have four church buildings, as well as small halls in East Saltoun and Humbie. In consultation with Presbytery, decisions were made to continue the use of Yester Church and the Session Rooms in East Saltoun. Presbytery also recommended that we close Bolton Church, although it is hoped that it can be retained for future use by the community. A decision about Saltoun Church and Humbie Church with the Stables will be made very soon. This is a very difficult process, in which the elders have participated and engaged with Presbytery for the past year, and I would like to invite you to hold them in your prayers during this tough time. Closing church buildings is not easy – and nobody makes such a decision lightly. There are so many emotional links, so many memories attached to 'our' church. Like moving out of a much-loved family home, it's hard to leave such attachments behind, but sometimes, such change is unavoidable. Our connections, our congregation and the friendships and support in it continue, as well as the memories.

I sincerely hope and pray that you will give the new arrangements, which will come into place gradually, a chance. We all are the church in Humbie, Yester, Bolton and Saltoun – and our church and its connections go beyond buildings. The pandemic time with its lockdowns showed this, when we couldn't physically meet together but connected and supported each other nonetheless. And think about how often you would travel across the parish to visit a specific shop or café, to attend a community event, an exercise class or a film night. In a similar way, I hope you'll consider travelling to a church service or event. If you have any worries about transport, please speak to me or an elder, and we'll arrange appropriate transport links. We don't want anybody to miss out because of longer journeys.

When Yester, Bolton and Saltoun first united into one parish in 2015, it took a while for us to get to know each other, and to become friends. It took time for us to get used to having one service moving around between Gifford, Bolton and Saltoun. The result is beautiful however: a good congregation on Sunday morning, many friends across the area, learning from and supporting each other — not to mention the beautiful singing that comes with a larger congregation. At some point in the new year, our currently linked congregations of Humbie and of Yester Bolton and Saltoun will unite into one single parish. We already have joint services together every fortnight, and appreciate coming together.

Whatever the decisions about the future of our buildings will be: they won't be implemented suddenly, and we'll have a grace period to introduce them and together work out how to shape the future of our church community. Change is never easy, but I would invite and encourage you to give it a chance: when Jesus lived among us, he did not have the one church building he attended, and since his days, the church has always been changing and adapting. Please come with us through the changes ahead, and help us to shape and to be the church we want to be, in order to love and to serve God and our community.
