Many of us have not met in a very long time, and, as it looks right now, it might yet be a while before gatherings as we used to know will be possible again. Despite the strange time in which we find ourselves, I have been encouraged and inspired by the huge outpouring of kindness and community spirit across the parish: the dedicated support systems in all the villages, with so many volunteers helping others who were, or still are, confined to their homes; the old and new connections forged between neighbours and friends; a rediscovery of just how important our relationships with each other are. Many of us have also gained a new appreciation of how vulnerable we all are, and of how lucky we are to live in such a beautiful part of the world.

Among the things upholding me at this time are the conversations with many of you, on the phone, by video call, or often — masked — in front of a shop or café, as well as near-weekly online get-togethers with my colleagues from across East Lothian and often further afield, in which we can discuss ideas and experiences, build better relationships with each other, and offer one another support, encouragement and mutual accountability. I also enjoy watching the changing seasons in our garden and the woods around us: really enjoying nature, and what it offers us, throughout the year.

With colourful autumn leaves falling, we are already looking towards Advent time. Traditionally, the weeks of Advent are shaped by the themes of peace, hope, joy and love. For many of us, these themes seem to be far from our minds, in the current circumstances. And yet, in small – and some bigger – ways, we can find them even in this unusual time. I see love in the way we can reach out to one another, care for each other, at this time seemingly more than ever before. I see joy in the way our son encounters the world: excited at pretty much everything he sees or hears or feels. I find hope in the creativity we all show in trying out new ways to do things. And I find peace in the faith that we're not alone: that God is with us, even in this strange time, even through the restrictions and the loneliness and isolation and pain. As we approach Advent, we look to the promise of Emmanuel, God with us, again: even at the strangest and most difficult of times.

Remembrance Sunday

Due to the current situation, we sadly won't be able to gather as a whole community around the War Memorials this Remembrance Sunday. Thanks to the generous assistance of Lothian Broadband, the services will be filmed, with the Gifford one livestreamed on 8 November at 11am, at **facebook.com/yesterboltonsaltounchurch** (no facebook account needed to watch), and available afterwards on our website. We hope you'll be understanding of these restrictions, which are in line with Scottish Government and East Lothian Council guidelines, and in place to keep us all safe.

Responding to Covid-19

Update and news from Gifford Community Council

"Love thy neighbour" is oft spoken, but the last seven months have shown this love and support in action in Gifford and surround thanks to a network of volunteers willing to put words into deeds.

With lockdown looming in March, Gifford Community Council's Single Point of Contact Adam White, and Deputy Wendy Ferguson met to begin to put their resilience plan into action. From the start Yester Church and its Minister, Aniko, were important parts of the group. Former Chairperson of Gifford Community Council, Jo Allen, also played a key role.

Step one was to assemble a group of volunteers able to offer practical support to the most vulnerable in our community – those who were being advised to shield due to existing health conditions, or those who were having to self-isolate due to Covid-19. A request for people to come forward was swiftly answered by over 70 people willing to help friends, neighbours and strangers alike. Over the next few months volunteers collected shopping and prescriptions, walked dogs and provided vital support all in a safe and confidential way.

As well as practical tasks, the Community Council was acutely aware of other issues that lockdown was highlighting – social isolation and potential food insecurity. 'Soup and a Smile' was launched delivering hot soup, a buttered roll and a scone to a number of households where there is an older resident on their own, or one providing care services for another. This service continues and has been joined by a monthly 'fish and chips Friday'. A network of volunteers deliver the food as well as a friendly word each Tuesday. All services are free of charge and funding was secured. A number of additional items were also delivered – from East Lothian Couriers to hand sanitiser from Glenkinchie Distillery, cakes from the Co-op and tea and chutney from Edinburgh Preserves as a result of a Christian Aid donation.

A Gifford Pantry was established in the Village Hall offering a range of food staples for any person who felt that they needed it — either because they were not confident accessing shops for health reasons, or because they were experiencing financial hardship. Funding was secured for the initiative, which was based on a similar model in Dirleton. Unfortunately and despite a feeling that there were people in the village who would benefit from it, the Pantry was not used and closed after three months with all surplus donated to the East Lothian Food Bank who also work within the village.

Towards the end of the summer holidays children's art packs were developed and shared with families in receipt of free school meals and more widely within the village area. These were developed by two younger members of our community with a range of craft and art activities all imaginatively packaged.

While the resilience network stood down on 31 July, Soup and a Smile and Fish and Chip Fridays continue, and the Community Council continues to monitor the local and national guidance. We are very grateful to everyone who participated in the network in whatever way, and proved that Gifford is a caring community.

Update and news from Buffy Neilson Saltoun Community Association

We are so proud of our little community. Everyone came together to help one another. We had about 20 volunteers willing to help out. We did pharmacy visits, shopped amongst other things. Our group is still open should anyone need anything. Massive thank you to everyone that has given up their time go help others. We are truly humbled.

Church service arrangements during Covid restrictions

Our Minister and Kirk Session discussed and agreed a mix of services in church and online for September and October that has worked well given the restrictions. It has provided the opportunity for members of the congregation who don't have internet to worship together.

Notwithstanding any changes to the Covid-19 regulations, the pattern of services for the weeks up to early January will continue as before. A full list of dates of Sunday and midweek services is available at the back of this newsletter, and on our website.

Current safety rules limit the number of people and households attending. Our property conveners have identified the number of seating positions in each church and we list below the maximum number of people for each of the churches, helping to show why we opted to use Yester for Sunday services, as this is the largest space.

YESTER: 38 SALTOUN: 29 BOLTON: 19

Test and Protect is a requirement for church services and that is why we use a "telephone ahead" system to record name and contact numbers. This reduces the need for recording details at the church door and helps the stewards when allocating seating.

For future services (except the Blue Christmas which does not need to be booked) please contact me by Friday evening for each Sunday service, and by the evening prior to weekday services.

Audio CDs are available for all Sunday services – simply call me if you would like to receive one. All services are also online – on our website and YouTube channel.

The Kirk Session has also decided to celebrate Holy Communion in the pre-recorded (video) services only, simply to ensure everyone's safety. Currently, we celebrate Holy Communion in these services on the last Sunday or the month – if you would like to participate simply have some bread and wine ready when you join in with the video or audio service.

Presbytery Plan Update

Readers will recall that just before the start of the Covid shutdown, a proposed new Presbytery Plan had been issued which could potentially have serious implications for the future of YBS and Humbie parishes, and responses from congregations about these proposed plans had been invited. Following this, a consultation meeting among the Kirk Session and members and wider community had been planned but the Covid restrictions made this impossible.

This has now been conducted by an online survey, and we're very grateful to all who participated. The results have been incorporated in a draft response to be approved by the Kirk Session at their November meeting before being issued to Presbytery.

In view of the Covid situation, Presbytery has suspended its original timetable and has not yet issued a new schedule: but it has confirmed that consultations will be held with all affected parishes, such as our own and Humbie, before finalising its proposals and seeking formal approval for them.

In the case of ourselves and Humbie, the five yearly Local Church Review (a consultation between Presbytery and the Kirk Session and congregation which sets out a record of the current life and witness of the parish) has also to be completed and considered by Presbytery before any decisions are taken: this will ensure that an accurate and up to date picture of our congregations is available as the basis of any decision making. It has been agreed with Presbytery that this process really requires meetings in person, and so the timetable has been put on hold meantime.

So no decision affecting our parish will be taken by Presbytery until the Local Church Review has been completed and considered by Presbytery and a new timetable for completion of consultations is issued. In any case, no decision would come into effect until such time as there is a vacancy again.

It is linked to East Lothian Council, the Haddington & Lammermuir Area Partnership and contributes to various ad hoc local consultations. The regular, usually monthly, meetings provide an additional link to the Local Councillors of the Haddington and Lammermuir ward.

The Community Council membership is drawn from volunteer representatives of each of the villages. Additional community-minded contributors are always welcome!

Joyce McIntosh

3 December 1949 – 9 May 2020

Joyce McIntosh, who sadly died earlier this year, was a much-loved member of our congregation and resident of East Saltoun. It was a sign of everyone's respect for her that the village street was lined with people, including a piper, as her funeral cortege left for the crematorium.

Joyce's family has lived in or around Saltoun for generations and she was an integral part of village and church life. She was one of our first female church elders, a stalwart of the Tithe Byre, a caring and well-liked assistant in the local Primary School, a key participant in the Playgroup and Summer Playschemes, an active supporter of the Gifford Horti, and much, much more. Her passing has had a huge impact on very many people.

Her gardening skills and knowledge ensured that, whatever Joyce sowed, every seed grew and over the years her plant stall has been a major fundraiser at church garden parties. She was our 'go to' for gardening advice and always generous with her time and plants. Many people have one of her plants in their gardens – a lovely reminder of her in the years ahead.

Like her mother before her, Joyce was a skilful – and speedy – knitter and there must be hundreds of babies locally, and even some around the world, who have been kept warm by her beautiful baby clothes.

But Joyce's first care was always for her family and her only regret that she would miss watching her grandchildren grow up. They can be assured of our love and support. Joyce was an amazing lady and will be sorely missed.

It has been decided to mark her importance to the community by erecting a bench in her memory. This is very much a whole community project, supported by her family. The wood has been sourced from local woodland; it is being made by our village carpenter and our village builder has offered to install it. Thanks to the generosity of those involved, the total cost will be very modest. Several people have already indicated that they would like to make a contribution and donations can be handed in to The Bothy. Any surplus money will be passed to the family to distribute as they feel appropriate.
